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The history behind the Walled Gardens of Cannington

Cannington Priory (later Cannington Court) was first established in about 1138 by the De Courcy family - lords of nearby Stogursey in Somerset. The manor and church was given by Robert De Courcy as the main endowment for a house of Benedictine nuns. The buildings and gardens have a very long history and have always played an important part in the life of the local community.

In the 14th Century there is some evidence of the start of corruption in the Priory. An inquiry in 1328 looked into the illicit wanderings of monks and nuns! It is said that there is a network of tunnels leading from Cannington Court to various spots in the village, which enabled the monks and nuns to meet in secret. The iron bound gates to be found at the entrance to Cannington Court are said to have been erected to keep the nuns in!

In 1536 the Nunnery was dissolved and the Court was held by Edward Rogers, a Member of Parliament for Somerset. In 1672, Charles II granted Cannington to Lord Clifford of Chudleigh. By the time the fourth Lord Clifford held the estate it was allowed to fall into disrepair, but was later restored by the fifth Lord Clifford.

In 1807, the Court became home once again to a community of Benedictine nuns, this time not the daughters of wealthy Somerset families, but nuns expelled from France. In 1919 the tenth Lord Clifford granted the lease of Cannington Court to Somerset County Council. The house and buildings were adapted for The Somerset College of Agriculture and Horticulture, known as The Somerset Farm Institute. The successor to the institute was Cannington College, which became nationally known for its provision of Land-based education.

In 2004, Cannington College merged with Bridgwater College. Since the merger there has been significant investment in facilities and equipment, including the redevelopment of the Walled Gardens, which became open to the general public.

In 2009, the Walled Gardens were officially opened by HRH the Earl of Wessex, Prince Edward and also achieved the accreditation of Quality Assured Visitor Attraction from VisitEngland.

As well as ensuring the continuation of a garden on this historic site, the Walled Gardens of Cannington provide a dynamic learning environment for students, as well as an area of real beauty and interest for visitors. We have every confidence that they will continue to evolve and will prove to be a place that visitors will look forward to returning to time and time again.

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CANNINGTON CENTRE

The Cannington Centre was known for many years as Cannington College, which was established in 1921 and had a long-standing reputation as a one of the key providers in the land-based education sector.

In September 2004, Cannington College merged with the local tertiary education provider, Bridgwater College, a move which secured a substantial investment package to significantly improve the provision at each of the land-based centres in Cannington, Paignton and Yeovil.

The Centres provide students studying land-based provision with valuable hands-on experience, and many elements are run on a commercial basis.

RODWAY FARM

The College Farm is set over 180 hectares, providing arable, pasture and conservation areas, while being home to a number of specialist livestock enterprises.

Over £1 million has recently been invested on developing the Farm, as it seeks to reposition itself not only as one of the leading dairy farms in the region, but also as one of the leading providers of agricultural training and education.

ANIMAL MANAGEMENT CENTRE

This £2 million facility provides a state-of-the-art setting for studying animal welfare. It has large theory and practical rooms, broken down into specialist animal areas - including a nocturnal room, and houses an extensive animal collection.

CANNINGTON EQUESTRIAN CENTRE

An approved British Horse Society (BHS) riding school, all instructors are BHS qualified and offer quality instruction in dressage and show jumping. Private and group lessons are available for riders of all abilities (aged 10 years +). There are also events and holiday activities and the facilities are available to hire at very competitive rates.

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What lies behind the walls of the Gardens

To some it's a mystery what sits behind the lovely stone walls of Cannington Court. Become enlightened to the beautiful Walled Gardens of Cannington which lie behind.

In 2009, The Countryside Heritage and Tourism Service of South Somerset District Council designated the Walled Gardens as one of the Classic Gardens of Somerset, which allows it to sit alongside Barrington Court and Hestercombe Gardens as a wonderful garden attraction in the county. To be listed as a Classic Garden the gardens must adhere to a strict criteria which includes: a special botanical interest in its plant diversity, its originality, a special architectural interest in its structure and layout; and a special educational interest in terms of the information made available to the public.

The extensive garden redevelopment and ongoing work has allowed Bridgwater College to provide a great resource for the community, staff and students. Boasting an array of unique gardens encourages visitors, which creates a positive effect to the local economy, whilst introducing people to the world of horticulture.

To provide you with an idea of what you can expect behind the walls, read on...

THE BLUE GARDEN

The Blue Garden is essentially a 'mixed border', consisting of a variety of different plant types such as trees, shrubs, perennials, roses, bulbs and annuals. The garden has been designed for year round interest; the first flowers to emerge are the Winter Anemones in February through to the Salvias, when the first frosts arrive.

True blue is a relatively rare colour among flowers. The hue is the 'pure' colour; a tint is a paler version of the hue and a shade is a darker version of the hue. In a monochromatic scheme the various tints and shades of a single hue are used.

THE HERBACEOUS BORDER

Previously this border contained trees and shrubs as well as herbaceous plants, but was still affectionately known as the herbaceous border. Prior to that the wall was covered with trained fruit trees forming part of a large walled productive garden. The border you see today was planted in April 2006.

A 'hot' colour scheme was adopted i.e. reds, oranges, yellows and pinks, which fit perfectly with the sunny, south facing aspect of the border. The design itself is repeated three times along the length of the border bringing a structured element with cohesion and uniformity.

THE PRODUCTIVE GARDEN

The tradition of building walled productive gardens with raised square beds stretches back at least 2500 years to the ancient Egyptians. Many cultures throughout history have built gardens of this type. This entire garden once grew all the food required for the resident monks and nuns.

The walls around this garden are useful for more than just security. One of the most important effects is to create a warmer microclimate inside the garden. This occurs by sheltering the garden from the wind and by absorbing the sun's heat in the daytime to release it at night.

THE SUB-TROPICAL WALK

Our sub-tropical walk is one of the few remaining elements of the old garden containing plants more commonly found in the warm temperate regions i.e. immediately to the North of the Tropic of Cancer and to the South of the Tropic of Capricorn.

The Walk was originally located between two arms of a previous 'H' shaped glasshouse and was called The Spanish Garden. The Trachycarpus (Fortune Palm), Cordylines (Cabbage Palm), Myrtus (Myrtles) and Accas (Pineapple Guava) were all features of that garden. It was decided early on to retain this feature and as such the walled garden design evolved around it, creating some quirky angles within the path layout.

AUSTRALASIAN GARDEN

There are more than 25,000 species of plants growing in Australia and New Zealand and many are hardy plants that are able to cope with the UK climate. Australia has a fascinating climate and

structure, from rich to poor desert soils, while New Zealand has many fine mountain ranges with very unusual flora that are able to cope with the extremes of temperature and climate.

As a general rule most Australasian plants do not like Chalk (Calcifuges) and should be treated as Ericaceous plants.

THE DRY GARDEN

Dry gardens (also known as gravel gardens) were relatively unheard of, but recently, due to the significant presence of global warming, they have become more and more popular. Our garden design contains many different plant types, from trees to bulbs, roses to herbaceous plants and shrubs to annuals. The garden has a very 'relaxed' feel; plants are encouraged to sprawl and merge into one another while annuals self-seed freely. Scent is also important in this garden, with many common kitchen herbs featured including Lavender and Rosemary.

The plants in a dry garden can all be classed as Xerophytes i.e. they have made some type of adaptation to cope with low rainfall and copious amounts of sun; therefore the most important requirement for these plants is a very free draining sub-striate; this can be achieved by incorporating plenty of drainage material such as grit.

FLORISTRY INTRODUCTION

This course offers an opportunity to design and create a range of floral displays for different purposes such as hand tied bouquets, floral arrangements and accessories.
